

Virginia Bluebells Ring in the Season of Spring

After three long months of winter, we all look forward to some sign of spring. For me, that sign is the emergence of woodland wildflowers in my front yard shade garden. One of the most conspicuous early risers is Virginia bluebells, *Mertensia virginica*. This member of the forget-me-not family, the Boraginaceae, loves rich, moist woodland soil and shade. In Wisconsin, it is found mostly in the southern counties but is scattered throughout the state. Virginia bluebells is one of two species of *Mertensia* native to the Badger state, the other being *Mertensia paniculata*, the Northern bluebells, which thrives in the boreal forest. Though they are similar in appearance, the leaves of Virginia bluebells are hairless while those of Northern bluebells are hairy on both sides of the leaf.

The genus *Mertensia* honors Franz Carl Mertens (1764-1831), a professor of botany in Bremen, Germany. The taxonomy of the genus *Mertensia* is less straightforward. Some botanists classify less than 20 species, while others have recorded over 100. Best guess is that there are between 40 and 60 species, many of which are considered threatened in their native range because of habitat destruction. The problem in classifying is that the plant is native to most of North America and much of Asia, but the species are difficult to distinguish from one another. Many are endemic to minute areas which are isolated from each other. Taxonomically, they may be similar in appearance, but reproductive isolation is one criterion for species classification. Most North American species are indigenous to very small areas of the Rocky Mountains.

Mertensia virginica is the exception, being found from Kansas in the west to Georgia, Alabama, and Maine in the east, and north into Canada. Hardiness ranges from zones 3 to 9. In Wisconsin it emerges in early April with deep purple leaves that quickly turn to blue-green or gray-green as the plant reaches its maximum height of two feet. Leaves are two to eight inches long, with the longer leaves at the base of the plant. Stems are near-

ly hollow and very fragile, with the appearance of a succulent plant. Virginia bluebells wastes no time in forming flowers. Loose clusters of tubular pink buds open into trumpet-shaped sky-blue flowers, rarely pink or white. Flowering is completed by mid-May. *Mertensia virginica* has the largest flowers of any species in the genus. Pollination is completed by bees, which often perforate the tube in order to reach the nectar. Butterflies and hummingbird moths also facilitate pollination. As the flowers fade, each will produce four nutlets. If soil conditions are to its liking, the plants will colonize.

Virginia bluebells is an ephemeral plant, meaning that the foliage dies down and gradually fades away after the seeds are dispersed. Since a colony of Virginia bluebells can leave quite a void in your garden, I recommend that other shade plants share its garden space. Hostas, ferns, coralbells, and epimedium make great companions. Allowing the plant to go dormant on its own may create a messy appearance in the garden, so as soon as the leaves begin to turn yellow, I cut my plants down to the ground. To date, this has not adversely affected them; in fact, I've had plenty to give away to fellow shade gardeners. The fleeting nature of the plant may make it difficult to find in garden centers, though. Get there early in the spring so the plant will still be visible in the pot.

Virginia bluebells are easy to grow and their early emergence is welcome after a long winter. It performs best in moist soil. Some references say that the plant will gradually fade away in dry soil, but I have had no issues with my plants, despite their being planted under shallow-rooted Norway maples. The gnarled black-coated tuberous roots extend deep into the soil and help it to resist drought. *Mertensia* has no significant pests and is not favored by deer. It will quickly be favored by you, however, if you add it to your shade garden.





After opening remarks, President Rob introduced our first speaker for the day.



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
Next up was Phil Timm on why YOU should be hybridizing!



Basics Of Hybridizing

- Hostas do not come true from seed.
- · Seed from Liberty will get you mainly green seedlings.
- · Only streaked plants give you streaked seedlings.
- Streaked plants can give you margined and/or medio seedlings.
- Hosta genetics are extremely unpredictable.
- The more seeds you plant the higher the success rate of something different.

- Seedlings germinate at a temperature between 70 75 degrees.
- Shop lights work great as a light source.
- The basic necessities:
 - Plant labels
 - o #2 pencil
 - Plastic cups with holes in the bottom
 - Storage containers
 - Potting mix
 - Algaecide
 - Tomato plant food
 - Empty gallon milk jug






Our last speaker, Mark Zilis, shared with us the story of Pete and Jean Ruh, starting with the start of Sunny Brook Farms, when his father Dr. Harold O. Ruh purchased 170 acres in 1928.



Pete registered 445 hostas, including 165 with his wife Jean (she also registered two without him). Only 58 were his own originations. The others were for 103 individuals, 12 nurseries, and 1 botanical garden, as well as in the name of three countries and 1 continent. Many of the people were deceased or inactive in the AHS and he wanted to make sure that they received credit for their plants.

In 2001, Pete and Jean set up a conservation easement on their property with Chagrin River Land Conservancy (now known as Western Reserve Land Conservancy) to protect their family lands for generations to come. The Conservancy purchased the land, then according to the Ruhs' wishes, sold 72 acres to Geauga Park District to be used as a public park, now known as the Sunnybrook Preserve.

Sunnybrook Preserve was made possible because of the foresight and dedication to conservation displayed by Harold & Edith Ruh and Frank & Minna Ferris.

Because they each had the persistence and conviction to protect the natural resources entrusted to them, these lands are now available for many to enjoy for generations to come.





MIDWEST REGIONAL HOSTA SOCIETY EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES Email

December 15, 2023

On December 15, 2023 President Rob Mortko called for an email meeting to approve the proposed MRHS budget for 2024 that was prepared by Treasurer Mona Keehn as required by the bylaws change adopted at the July 2023 Convention. The proposed budget differed from past annual budgets in that all 2024 convention revenue and expenditures would flow through MRHS since we do not have a sponsoring local society. Rob invited questions and comments from the board members.

Meeting participants included Rob Mortko, Mike Kraus, Barry Ankney, Dave Collura, Kay Dye, Mary Schwartzbauer, Mona Keehn, Phil Timm and Mary Vertz.

Vice President Mike Kraus asked several questions about the 2024 convention budget and Rob obtained responses and clarifications from convention co-chair Glenn Herold. After Rob modified the budget to reflect a couple of changes there was no further discussion. Barry Ankney made a motion to approve the budget and it was seconded by Mary Vertz. Rob called for a vote and the budget was approved by all of the board members who cast votes on December 18, 2023. Dave Collura, Kay Dye and Phil Timm did not vote.

Midwest Regional Hosta Society Board Meeting Minutes February 23, 2024 Brookfield WI

The board met the evening before the MRHS Winter Symposium. President Rob Mortko, Vice President Mike Kraus, Immediate Past President Mary Schwartzbauer, Treasurer Mona Keehn, Membership Chair Dave Collura, Webmaster Barry Ankney, Newsletter Editor Mary Vertz, Region V AHS Representative Kay Dye, Member-at-Large Phil Timm and Secretary Mark Rekoske were all in attendance. President Mortko called the meeting to order at about 6:10 p.m.

Mortko opened by recalling the December e-meeting where we approved the society's 2024 budget. He asked for a treasurer's report and Keehn responded that there is no new news to report. The savings account balance is \$57249 and the checking account balance is \$21085. There were no questions or discussion about the state of our finances.

Collura provided a membership report. He noted that there are currently 387 members, including 84 who have not yet renewed their memberships for 2024. This is up a bit from the recent past. Dave noted that there were 18 new members registered at last year's Master Gardeners convention in Kansas City thanks to the efforts of Barry Ankney. It is unknown how many of these new members will renew. Dave asked the board whether we should continue to give a new member package to each person granted a complimentary membership at our conventions. The \$10 voucher cost is absorbed by our participating vendors so the consensus was to continue the practice.

The board also reviewed the practice of granting a complimentary one-year membership or a one-year extension of membership to all convention attendees. Board members agreed that the complimentary memberships were a good stimulus for convention attendance. The board voted unanimously to continue the complimentary memberships.

Mary Vertz reminded the board to submit all articles for the spring newsletter by March 15.

Mortko began a discussion of the Winter Symposium financials. He recalled that he has been a proponent of operating the symposium as a break-even event. This year hotel costs are up a bit and in order to maintain the registration unchanged we had budgeted for an expected attendance of 110. Today, only 98 registrations have been received so far and the added cost of including Marco Fransen results in a projected shortfall of about \$400. However, Rob reported that the silent auction managed by Rob James will likely save us from a loss. Rob James has modified the auction to rely on living seedlings from members and plants donated from vendors to be shipped in spring to provide the bulk of the revenue. James has done a terrific job of getting donations and projects revenue from the silent auction of about \$1500.

Despite substantial publicity, reminders, the low registration fee and the added draw of speaker Marco Fransen, it appears our annual attendance may be capped at about 100. On the bright side, this is almost one-third of the MRHS membership and can be regarded as a great turnout compared to other organizations. There was also some discussion of how far members will travel for a one-day meeting. There has probably been some falloff in attendance from the Chicago area since moving the meeting to Brookfield, but there is likely an increase in attendance by Wisconsin members. We have some attendees from the Great Lakes region, likey due to the draw of Marco Fransen.

Mortko announced that the Wisconsin Hosta Society had volunteered to fund the Jack Barta Scholarship this year. Last year, after the death of Jack Barta, the Shades of Green Hosta Society made a donation to honor Jack for his many contributions to MRHS by funding a scholarship. A winner will be selected and announced by Mortko tomorrow using a random number generator. Perhaps other local societies will sponsor future scholarships.

Mortko turned to an update on the 2024 Convention in Fond du Lac. The convention is on! Recently, the hotel contract was finalized. Committee chairs are all in place and planning is ongoing. The lack of "boots on the ground", since no local society is sponsoring the convention, will re-

quire help from more remote volunteers. Perhaps there are members in the Wisconsin Hosta Society who can step in to help.

The Central Illinois Hosta Society, based in Peoria, will host a combined AHS/MRHS convention in 2025. The theme will be "Double Feature" and information on the dates and venue can be found on the AHS and MRHS websites. AHS and MRHS have reached an agreement to share auction revenue and expenses. Any shortfall will be equally shared by the AHS and MRHS. The Paradise hotel, the same venue used at the 2018 MRHS Convention will be convention hotel. Barry Ankney described some of the preparatory activities. Ankney requested a loan of \$2000 from MRHS to the Peoria group to offset some of their upfront costs. He reported that AHS has already advanced a \$2000 loan. The board voted unanimously to make a \$2000 loan to the Central Illinois Hosta Society.

Mortko then turned to a discussion of the process used to select recipients of the DeEtta Montgomery Award and the difficulties that ensue when a potential recipient is a member of the board. Rob suggested we consider a procedure similar to that employed by the AHS. He recommended that we create a committee to solicit nominations for the award. The committee would be tasked to evaluate the nominations and make a selection. The committee would consist of the MRHS immediate past president and the two most recent Montgomery Award winners. The committee would solicit the MRHS membership for nominations which should make members feel more engaged in the process. All agreed with Rob's recommendation and the board voted to go forward with the creation of a selection committee.

When there was no other new business presented the meeting was adjourned at about 7:30 p.m.

Midwest Regional Hosta Society Educational Fund

At the Midwest Regional Hosta Society (MRHS) Executive Committee meeting held at the Dubuque Convention, it was decided to set aside funds for specific educational enhancements of current and/or future AHS National Display Gardens within Region 5. The funds will be available for any AHS National Display Garden within the region that is sponsored by a local hosta society.

Application for these funds must be submitted to the Vice-President of the Midwest Regional Hosta Society. The application must be submitted by the local society that is requesting funding of a specific educational aspect of the sponsored garden. A committee composed of the Vice-President, Immediate Past President, and the Treasurer of MRHS will review and make recommendations to the Executive Committee for awarding grant money.

Funding for any specific project may not exceed \$300 per project in a single calendar year, with each local society limited to a single project per year.

Specific guidelines for eligible projects include but are not limited to the following:

- Producing handouts or brochures that are available at the garden that provide specific educational information about Hosta.
- Producing or updating garden signs that provide information about the display garden or a specific component of the garden related to Hosta.
- Installing a new display bed that features some specific collection of Hosta, for example, a miniature Hosta collection, a collection of introductions from a specific hybridizer, a collection of Hostas related to one of the Hosta species (like a H. plantaginea bed with cultivars derived from that species).
- Procuring display cases or containers to hold educational materials for public distribution.

The local society who is granted funding of a specific project must agree to provide documentation of the project being completed by providing samples of educational materials that are produced, providing photographs of the completed project, and submitting a report to the MRHS Executive Committee.
